MEETING MINUTES November 19, 2025

1. Call to Order / Roll Call / Introductions

A regular meeting of the Sacramento Valley Basinwide Air Pollution Control Council, Technical Advisory Committee was called to order by Chair Joseph Tona at 1:30 pm via Zoom teleconference. Attendees were as follows:

2. Period of Public Comment

Mr. Tona opened the floor to public comment; hearing none, the public comment period was closed.

3. Approval of Minutes from the October 15, 2025 Meeting

MOTION: Mr. Ertle moved to approve the minutes as presented. The motion was seconded by Ms. Roberts, and the motion passed with no objections.

4. Approval of Financial Status Report as of October 31, 2025

Ms. LaGrone submitted financial reports through October 31, 2025 and warrants to be paid.

MOTION: Mr. White moved to approve the financial reports as presented. The motion was seconded by Mr. Tona, and the motion passed with no abstentions or objections.

<< Ms. Allen joined the meeting at about 1:38pm>>

5. CSDA Fees – BCC/TAC Secretary-Treasurer

Ms. LaGrone explained that the CSDA bill sent in early October was nearly triple what it has been for several years. An inquiry revealed that CSDA has held the BCC rate artificially low for five years and the substantial increase had not been explained. CSDA subsequently revised the invoice from \$1398 to \$750 (an increase of 150% of previous years' invoices). There was discussion about the need for CSDA membership.

MOTION: Ms. Roberts made a conditional motion: if the BCC's liability insurance through SDRMA requires membership in CSDA, the terms should be accepted and the \$750 bill should be paid. If membership is not required, approval of this warrant is tabled for a vote at the December TAC meeting. Mr. White seconded the motion, and the motion passed with no abstentions or objections.

Mr. White requested of the Secretary-Treasurer that full compliance with the recently updated Brown Act rules, for onboarding new board members and more, be met for the January and February meetings.

6. Status Reports

- <u>CAPCOA</u> Mr. Tona listed the officers for 2026 and briefly described the CAPCOA 50th anniversary party. CAPCOA board meetings will now be two-day events. The next meeting will be December 9th.
- <u>PEEPs</u> The PEEPs met at Colusa County APCD the previous week. Mr. Peacock reported that the new PEEPS liaison in 2026 will be Lindsay Schurig of Shasta County AQMD.

PEEPS requests setting up a new document sharing site; Feather River AQMD will look into making a site available through their network, pending legal approval.

- <u>CA Air Resources Board (CARB)</u> Mr. Gerber has continued to ask, on behalf of the BCC, the CARB leadership for direction regarding mobile burn units. Jason Branz and Jeremy Aviso welcome BCC input regarding such permitting, but CARB has not finalized any decision as yet.
- <u>SMP Committee</u> no report.
- <u>SMP Coordinator</u> Coordinator Tawa reported sending an email to all districts to ask if the Fall Intensive Burn Season should end nine days early (Friday November 21). Most districts are in favor, but a final decision has not been made yet.

Coordinator Tawa said that 2025 has been the third wettest rice season in over 20 years. The end-of-season report will be ready for the January TAC meeting.

7. Letter to CARB – Joe Tona

The draft of the letter, requesting CARB's opinion regarding the permitting of burn bots, air curtain incinerators and mobile gasification units as stationary sources, will be on the December TAC agenda.

8. BCC Fee Structure Discussion – Joe Tona

The committee met November 18 and is considering several options. The committee will present their findings when ready.

9. **2026 Meeting Schedules** – BCC/TAC Secretary-Treasurer

MOTION: Mr. Ertle moved to accept the proposed 2026 TAC and BCC schedules as presented. Mr. Brown seconded the motion, and the motion passed with no abstentions or objections.

10. Biomass Utilization

Mr. White reported recent conversations with Elizabeth Bettencourt of the Department of Conservation about a study of the financial benefits of biomass utilization. Questions surrounding the study include what the scope of the work will be, and who will perform the work. More details to come.

Mr. White said that the CPUC is proposing the termination of the BioMAT program (Bioenergy Market Adjusting Tariff) and is receiving pushback. There is a lot of support for the program, and supporters want the CPUC to revise, not end, the program.

Ms. Roberts and Mr. Ayala of Sacramento-Metropolitan AQMD recently met with the team from Caribou Biofuels to provide feedback about their mobile gasification program. SMAQMD found the company not yet ready to enter the permitting process, with no data to provide.

11. Member Reports and Future Agenda Items

Ms. Skelton introduced new Glenn County APCD team member Bryan Marquardt.

Mr. Brown reminded members of the new requirement for ADA access compliance for web sites beginning in January 2026, and offered the name of the company that his district has hired.

Mr. Brown is concerned that the EPA has not approved FRAQMD's PM maintenance plan that they submitted in 2023.

Letter to Carb-Portable Equipment 12/11/2025 Supporting Documents

Sacramento Valley air districts are increasingly receiving inquiries from public agencies, land managers, and private operators regarding the deployment of small-scale, portable biomass-reduction and biochar-producing technologies. While these devices may offer benefits—such as reducing open pile burning, supporting hazardous-fuel reduction goals, and diverting woody biomass from landfills—the current regulatory framework does not provide clear or uniform pathways for permitting, nor clarity regarding eligibility under the Portable Equipment Registration Program (PERP).

To ensure consistent statewide implementation and avoid conflicting district-level interpretations, we request CARB's clarification and guidance on the appropriate permitting pathways for the following categories of equipment:

1. Air Curtain Incinerators (ACI), Including Carbonizer Variants

Description:

Traditional ACIs use a high-velocity air curtain over a combustion chamber—either a refractory box or earthen pit—to increase combustion efficiency and reduce visible emissions.

Modern "carbonizer" and variants are designed to produce biochar as a primary product rather than ash but share many functional and physical characteristics with ACIs. Some models are track-mounted, with a single engine powering both locomotion and the air-curtain system.

Regulatory ambiguity:

- Some vendors assert that carbonizers qualify for PERP registration due to the portability.
- Districts need clarity on:
 - whether ACIs or carbonizers meet the PERP definition of "portable equipment" under Title 13 §2452.
 - whether their combustion function constitutes a stationary source activity incompatible with PERP, and
 - whether fuel-treatment operations (rather than auxiliary industrial processes) affect PERP eligibility

2. Mobile BurnBots (Automated Pile-Burning / Vegetation-Treatment Units)

Description:

BurnBots and similar robotic vegetation-treatment systems use an enclosed combustion chamber with automated airflow and temperature controls to ignite, contain, and extinguish biomass. They are designed for in-field fuel reduction with minimized smoke production and are typically track-mounted or wheeled.

Regulatory ambiguity:

- These devices combine features of ACIs, thermal oxidizers, and mobile equipment.
- It is unclear whether they should be:
 - permitted as stationary combustion or control devices,
 - treated as open outdoor burning subject to district burning rules,
 - eligible for PERP as portable equipment, or
 - regulated as off-road mobile sources due to their self-propelled nature and active in-motion fuel consumption.

3. Portable Biomass/Biochar Units (Batch Pyrolysis, Gasification, and Char Production Systems)

Description:

These units use pyrolysis or gasification to convert biomass material into biochar, syngas, or heat. They are typically trailer-mounted or skid-mounted and intended for deployment directly to fuel-reduction or vegetation-management sites. Emissions profiles vary widely depending on design and operating conditions.

Regulatory ambiguity:

- Some operators claim PERP applicability based on portability and temporary site residence.
- Key guestions include whether:
 - whether trailer-mounted pyrolysis or gasification systems meet PERP's definition of "portable equipment,"
 - o whether their emissions and combustion processes require stationary source permitting,

Air districts strongly support innovative technologies that reduce wildfire risk, improve forest health, and potentially lower emissions compared to traditional open burning. However, formal guidance from CARB is requested to ensure that these technologies are permitted, regulated, and operated consistently across jurisdictions.

We respectfully request that CARB provide: A written determination clarifying eligibility or ineligibility for PERP or mobile eligibility for each equipment category

Sacramento Valley Basinwide Air Pollution Control Council Legislative Platform

Objective:

As specified in the Sacramento Valley Basinwide Air Pollution Control Council (BCC) bylaws, the BCC will participate in the development and promotion of legislation beneficial to the Sacramento Valley Air Basin, and oppose legislation that is not beneficial. This platform will allow the BCC as authorized pursuant to California Health and Safety Code (CH&SC) Section 40900 to respond in a timely fashion to relevant legislation with BCC approval.

Principal Goal:

Promote healthy air quality for public health benefits and coordinate all air pollution control activities to ensure that the entire Sacramento Valley Air Basin is, or will be in compliance with the requirements of State and Federal law.

Legislative Platform:

- 1. Support legislation that advances the continued utilization of the Connelly-Areias-Chandler Rice Straw Burning Reduction Act of 1991 (pursuant to CH&SC Section 41865).
- 2. Support legislation that advances the utilization of agricultural biomass and other technologies that reduce air pollution resulting from agricultural activities.
- 3. Support and encourage legislation to increase incentive funding available for programs that provide early emission reductions through voluntary action to decrease the burden of regulatory actions on agriculture, business, and industry.
- 4. Support legislation promoting energy efficiency and clean alternative energy.
- 5. Support air quality legislation that incorporates rational approaches to regulation, is based on solid scientific principles and considers the costs to business.
- 6. Support legislation that reduces the regulatory burden on business by encouraging consistency among local air districts, state, and federal programs, where it is reasonably feasible.
- 7. Support legislation that encourages innovation and provides flexibility to air pollution control districts and local businesses in meeting air quality goals.
- 8. Support legislation to increase state and federal funding for mandated programs and provide additional funding for new mandates from the state and federal government.
